### A Message From The Undergraduate President

Although these first few months have been a bit overwhelming, they have also been very exciting.

I began my presidency at the bid night ceremony on January 22, which began the new member period for our amazing new class of women. In the beginning of February, along with our vice president of finance, Kristen Diver '08, I traveled to St. Louis for this year's Leadership Academies. We arrived early on a Friday morning, and once we got to the hotel, we immediately encountered dozens of our counterparts from various colleges throughout the eastern half of the country.

The first night served as more of an introduction, and after dinner, we had the opportunity to visit Pi Phi headquarters and take a tour of the facilities—which actually turned out to be a lot of fun. Headquarters serves as a sort of museum for relics of Pi Phi's past—such as letters, pictures, and information on famous alumnae, including former First Lady Grace Coolidge.

The next morning, we had our first presentation by Jennifer Robin of the Leadership Development Center at Bradley University. Throughout the course of the next two days, we alternated between large seminars about different aspects of leadership—goal setting, motivation, delegation, etc.—and smaller breakout/discussion groups. We also received the results of the Myers-Briggs Type Indicator survey that we had completed a few weeks prior. For those of you who are familiar with the test, I turned out to be an ENFJ-signifying extroversion, intuition, feeling and judging. Along with my results, I received feedback on the specifics of my leadership type—including advice on how to build on my strengths and work on my weaknesses. The summary was really accurate, and I have been working to incorporate all of the suggestions into my daily tasks as president.

The entire weekend was a great experience, but I would have to say that the best part of the weekend was the oppor-

tunity to talk to all of the other presidents. It is one thing to be able to talk to presidents of other Panhellenic chapters here at Cornell, but it was completely different to touch base with women who are acting as leaders of the same organization I am. With the new officer structure being implemented this year, our executive board has been working hard to make the transition between positions. I met presidents from many other Pi Phi chapters who were dealing with the same transitional issues we are, and we got to exchange ideas on how to work through those problems.

Overall, I came away from the Leadership Academy with a better sense of myself as a leader and an even stronger sense of pride about our chapter. I am excited to be the president of such a strong chapter and look forward to developing our potential to be one of the best Pi Phi chapters in the country.

### Sisters Work To Support Cancer Research

New York Deltas will be on the move with their latest philanthropy venture, Relay for Life. The 12-hour, overnight event is the American Cancer Society's largest fundraiser and is scheduled for April 1-2 at Cornell University's Barton Hall. This will be the second year Cornell has held the event and our second year of participation.

The event consists of forming teams of eight to 20 people and fundraising money within groups prior to the relay. During the actual event, at least one person from each team must be walking around the track at all times—symbolizing the long battle cancer fighters must endure. In between their laps, team members may enjoy free food, games, and performances from local dance and

singing groups. Still, the essential goal of the event is to raise money for cancer research to help current and future cancer sufferers.

"Preserving life is one of the most fundamental and uplifting things we can do," said Tara Young '08, entertainment co-chair for the event's steering committee. And, considering their immense personal investments in the relay, it would seem that many New York Deltas agree.

In addition to Tara, there are three other Pi Phis on the event's steering committee—Mimi Do '07, entertainment cochair, Felicia Daniels '07, logistics cochair, and Simi Katragadda '06, founder and chair of Cornell's first relay chapter.

"Last year, I brought relay to campus because I felt that (Cornell) was lacking an important contribution to society. So many people, including our own chapter's members, have been personally affected in some way by cancer," Katragadda said.

Many members of New York Delta seem to have taken those words to heart—including newly initiated members—forming five, class-year affiliated teams led by: Jen Barndt '06, Olivia Haedt '07, Kate Powers '08, Elizabeth Phillips '09, and Renee Belilse '09.

"Though we split up our teams between classes, if we were to be just a Pi Phi team and totaled all of our donations, we would be in first place, and that is amazing," Mimi said.

#### Chapter Remains Philanthropically Strong

Each of the participating sororities decorates water jugs—transforming them into unique creations that reflect their house's personality and style.

The jugs will be on display on central campus from March 6-10, with people donating money toward the water jug they feel is decorated the best. At the close of the competition, the money raised will be split between Pi Kappa Phi's and the winner's national philanthropies. Pi Phis are enthusiastic about this fun competition; we know that no matter if we win or lose all of the money raised is going towards a great cause!
