This event celebrates the life and work of Dr. Suess and was especially important this year, as it marked the 50th anniversary of *The Cat in the Hat*. We worked with the Tompkins County Public Library and created a Dr. Suess story time for young children.

Pi Phi members and librarians dressed up as the cat in the hat, which was exciting for the kids. Dr. Suess books were read to children, and then they worked on a related craft project with our philanthropy committee. This was a really great way to work with young children and their parents in the community, and everyone had a great time. We hope to work with the library to plan future events.

Chapter and member donations were given to the Pi Phi virtual book drive through First Book. Ecuador broadens sisters' perspectives

At first sight, Guayaquil leaves no grand impression upon a traveler passing by. Most guidebooks do not even include the largest city in Ecuador as a spot worth visiting and focus instead on the world-renowned Galapagos Islands, the infamous ring of volcanoes that are scattered through the Andes, or Quito—the capital city which is much more tourist-friendly.

But for a few of us Pi Phis, Guayaquil became home for a few precious months, and a city that fell below some guidebook's radar revealed its beauty to us through our unique relationships and experiences.

The adventure started with Jessica Schindler '07, who was abroad in Ecuador last spring. Schindler found out about the program in Ecuador through the abroad services offered at Cornell. The International Partnership for Service-Learning and Leadership is a program that provides students with unique opportunities to volunteer and study in over 40 different countries.

Jess studied at the Universidad Espiritú Santos and spent her mornings working at the Fundación Cariño, a center that reaches out to malnourished children and infants. Jess would either stay at the foundation and play with the children or she would go out into the community and try to convince the children to come to the center for food.

The children who live and work on the streets of the city often provide a main source of income for their families, and it is difficult to convince them to leave the streets, stop working, and go to the foundation. The same problem presents itself to students who volunteer at the Fundacíon Crecer, a foundation that seeks out children who live and work on the streets and invites them to come every day to learn and play and to help integrate them into the school system.

My volunteering experience was substantially different from Jess's. I spent every morning in a small "suburb" of the city. "Los suburbios" (or "las invasiones"), that are nothing like American suburbs; they are shanty towns, ghettos, and communities made up of rough cement houses with corrugated metal roofs.

I worked in a small clinic that served the community. The clinic treated all children under 5 years old and pregnant mothers for free, and the rest of the patients paid \$1 to see the doctor. The volunteers helped with patient preparation: We would

measure the patients, take their temperature and blood pressure, and record general symptoms. I also helped with organizing the patients' folders and distributing medicine from the pharmacy.

For not having any prior experience in medicine or clinical work, the job was incredibly challenging at times, but it forced me to use my Spanish and take risks that I would never be afforded in the United States (i.e., giving flu vaccinations to 80 year olds out on the street).

Julia Schneider '07 is presently in Guayaquil, studying at "la U" and volunteering for an agency called Sor Dominga Boca. The agency serves as a type of sanctuary for girls who have suffered from domestic or sexual abuse within their homes. Sor Dominga Boca gives them a place to live while their unsafe or unstable situations at home are sorted out. The volunteers are basically there to spend time with the girls, help them with their homework, plan activities for them, and most importantly, give them the love and care they have been lacking.

Besides studying and volunteering, Julia has been able to travel around Ecuador on the weekends, exploring the wonderfully diverse geography that the country offers—beaches, mountains, volcanoes, the Amazon Basin, and the Galapagos.

Why South America? Why Ecuador when the rest of our sorority sisters are in Europe or Australia, probably enjoying certain luxuries such as hot and potable water, an existing fashion culture, and a lack of "grillo" or mosquito invasions?

"I think my overall experience and the things I accomplished were well worth the minor struggles and discomforts of day-to-day living," said Jess.

In my opinion, I think it's worth changing up your perspective once in awhile to be able to objectively reflect upon your own culture and values and appreciate the little things in life that we so easily take for granted. iViva Ecuador!
