If you're reading this as an alumna, there's a good chance that you attended Cornell when Pi Phi had one house telephone, cell phones either weren't around or were the size of massive bricks, and typewriters were new and considered portable. For many of you, the Internet was a fantasy existing only in science fiction books and movies—assuming that those even existed that long ago (just kidding). But honestly, when you traveled, did errands, or just sat at home, you had the ability to completely disconnect from other people. It was a simpler time, and independence was truly independence. To be honest, I don't understand how anyone did it.

While studying abroad in Rome this past fall, having the Internet and a cell phone was invaluable. I was able to stay in touch with my Pi Phi family, and share photos and stories with the simple click of a button. Despite this, Italians are known for remaining extremely close to friends and family because they spend so much time together talking, eating, and generally socializing. A lot can be said about this emphasis on face-to-face communication and its ability to bring people together. During my semester abroad, I was lucky enough to actually spend some time in Italy, France, and Sweden with fellow Pi Phi sisters Jane Whalen '11 and Meaghan Frank '11. I can honestly say that these visits were the highlights of my semester. I had an amazing time and grew much closer to those girls by exploring our respective cities and teaching each other a thing or two about the cultures. While I was in Sweden, I realized I actually had hardly taken any pictures at the end of the trip. The reason behind this was that I had been having so much fun just spending time with Meaghan that the idea of taking pictures completely slipped my mind. We were enjoying each other's company, face-to-face, and it was that much more meaningful.

So to all of you active Pi Phis who can't fathom one phone for 40 girls, and to all of you alumnae who remember it so fondly, I've found that technology is wonderful when it comes to staying in touch with sisters far away, but the extra effort associated with snail mail and faceto-face interaction is unmatched in terms of connecting with sisters from far across the globe.

Spotlight on Mara Perman: Making Meaningful Connections

NY Deltas are truly spectacular: As Pi Phis, we strive to enioin a universal fun-loving spirit with a greater commitment toward serving our world. Junior Mara Perman '11 exemplifies of this goal: Not only did she charm audiences during our rush skit with her sparkling performance as fictional movie anchorman Ron Burgundy, but she also reminds Pi Phi of our truly lasting goals through her commitment to service.

While Mara has always shown a commitment to others-whether it be by sharing a funny anecdote or helping with homework in the living room-this commitment translated into inspiring action when she spent her summer in Babti, Tanzania, to teach HIV/AIDS education. Working through an NGO based in Arusha, Tanzania, called Support for International Change, Mara taught comprehensive education programs to children and adult community groups, collectively teaching over 6,000 people and testing more than 2,000.

Mara worked tirelessly in order to serve her organization, despite the added challenge of a torn meniscus and ACL. Characteristic of resilient Mara, she didn't allow this to hinder her effectiveness as a teacher, taking every opportunity to spread HIV/AIDS education, even outside of scheduled sessions. Mara recalls, "We soon found ourselves leading a massive question-and-answer session with dozens of young men, arguably the most important demographic for HIV education. This teaching made me realize that health education can come in so many different forms, and public health policy should not be limited to what is conventional."

Mara continues to support her organization from New York, starting the first SIC chapter at Cornell. Our chapter is lucky to have Mara, who is changing the world as only a Pi Phi could.


