

New York Delta Scholarship

The chapter is pleased to announce the establishment of a scholarship through the Pi Beta Phi Foundation. After several years of fiscally responsible spending, the chapter accumulated more than \$50,000 to establish the endowment to fund one annual scholarship per year of approximately \$2,000.

The New York Delta Scholarship

The New York Delta Scholarship is restricted to active members of the New York Delta Chapter of Pi Beta Phi who are in good standing. In order to apply for the scholarship, candidates must have a cumulative GPA of 3.0, be in good financial standing, and be a full-time student at Cornell during the academic year that the scholarship is to be used.

Carly Dean '14, the first recipient of this award, describes its effect on her work as a student in the College of Architecture, Art, and Planning:

"I am a junior enrolled in Cornell University's five-year Bachelor of Architecture degree program, with aspirations to use architecture and design as a social empowerment tool. As the first recipient of the Pi Beta Phi Foundation scholarship, I am immensely appreciative of the financial support that enabled me to travel to South Africa and help construct the first preschool—Early Childhood Development Centre—of Cosmo City, which is a mixed-income development of Johannesburg.

"I am a leader of Cornell University Sustainable Design (CUSD), which is an interdisciplinary, student-led design-build organization. Over the past two years, our Schoolhouse South Africa team has raised funds, as well as researched, designed, and procured the materials to build this school, which we hope will serve as

Sponsored by *Cosmopolitan*, Maybelline, and *Seventeen*, the event entailed kissing postcards and writing notes that will be sent to the troops overseas for New Year's Eve. Together, we crafted 1,000 kissed messages of love and support.

From overseeing chapter events to ensuring the well-being of our members, the time I have spent as president has been incredibly fulfilling. The experience has helped me to grow as a leader, and I know I am a better woman because of it. This summer, 20 Cornell students (myself included) traveled to South Africa to construct the school alongside 20 local laborers. With an office, kitchen, bathrooms, four classrooms for up to 80 students (up to seven years old), and a vegetable garden, this preschool will be opened in January 2012 at the beginning of their school year.

"The experience was life-changing in terms of being able to witness the empowerment and curiosity of the surrounding community. Political unrest, post-apartheid socioeconomic tensions, HIV, and illiteracy all burden South Africa. This preschool gives hope to children in pursuit of higher education and to women who will be trained to be teachers by our partners, the local Play With a Purpose organization. Thank you to the Pi Beta Phi Foundation for the opportunity to travel to South Africa and for supplying the preschool with its first children's books."

SnappyScreen: Sunscreen in a Snap!

As early as I can remember, I have had an interest in entrepreneurship. My best friend (and business partner) and I were the entrepreneurs of Millford Drive. Together, we manned lemonade stands, sold home-baked cookies door-to-door, and founded "Funcare," a weeklong summer day camp for kids ages two through six, which profited \$1,000 a week when we were only 12 years old. Who knew "Funcare" would lead me to the career path I am presently pursuing here at Cornell.

I am a senior in the School of Industrial and Labor Relations, where I'm pursuing my

business concept, "SnappyScreen." SnappyScreen is an airbrush sunscreen-application system that disperses a fine mist of sunscreen, which covers the user from head to toe. This idea first originated during the summer before my freshman year at Cornell. My sister, also a proud Pi Phi, and I were vacationing on a beach in the Bahamas. We were complaining to one another about how long it took us to put on sunscreen and I thought, "there must be a faster way to do this."

Upon arriving at Cornell, I decided to test my business idea and entered the Cornell's Entrepreneurship Organization's "Elevator Pitch" contest, and placed second to a graduate student. A domino effect followed from there. In the spring semester of my freshman year, I was accepted into Cornell's e-Lab, a student program that provides office space, access to accountants and attorneys, and an unbelievable mentorship network comprised of successful entrepreneurs and other professional alumni.

SnappyScreen has been a work in progress. The original prototype design has changed with every year of development. This past summer, the device was ready to launch a trial period! The mentorship network I maintained through e-Lab afforded me the amazing opportunity to debut SnappyScreen at the Aruba Marriott Resort and Stellaris Casino for a full week in August. The response was outstanding. The hotel management team and Marriott guests were extremely supportive. Marriott's public relations department promoted Cornell University and



immediately SnappyScreen upon my arrival to the resort. The Marriott Daily Activities newsletter welcomed me and SnappyScreen, and invited guests to try the device near the hotel's towel hut. On the first day, the PR cameraman arrived and gave me 10 minutes to come up with something to say on tape for the hotel's Facebook page. The next day, the local newspaper, Aruba Today, ran a story with photos, and by Friday, the local TV station, Aruba TV-15, filmed SnappyScreen for their news spot.

The first day, 60 people tried the device and completed the survey. On day two, there was a 50 percent return rate for application, and overall, ap-

proximately 75 guests tried SnappyScreen that day. By day three, more than 100 guests had used the device, and I ended operations an hour earlier than the first two days. By day four, I had completely finished up all of my sunscreen. In only two hours, 55 people used SnappyScreen. The response was more than I ever imagined. The excitement around the device was contagious.

One of the main initiatives of SnappyScreen has been to educate society about the importance of protection from the sun's rays. SnappyScreen plans to donate a percentage of its profits to the Melanoma Research Foundation. Many dermatologists are concerned that sunscreen provides a false sense of protection. Fortunately, while testing SnappyScreen in Aruba, it was evident that the ease and time-saving use of SnappyScreen encouraged guests to reapply sunscreen every two to three hours for better protection. People came back every day to show me how evenly they tanned and did not burn after using SnappyScreen. Marriott guests were so enthusiastic about the concept, many offered their contact information to reach out to them for investments. The outpour of support was astounding.

SnappyScreen continues to make great progress. We are currently working on manufacturing and interviewing our first stage of investors. The final design is scheduled for launch in summer 2012. Be on the lookout for SnappyScreen, and check out YouTube to view the product in action, in Aruba!



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something kind or funny. She was an activist who spread compassion for the homeless and disenfranchised. She had a passion for animals (especially her dog, Japhy), and she loved to run. She was a state-champion runner in high school, ran track at Cornell for two years, and became an ultramarathoner after college. Katie was finishing a PhD in cell and molecular physiology at UC Davis, but she still managed to travel the world and spend time rock-climbing and hiking with Japhy.

We were devastated to hear of Katie's passing, but not entirely shocked. She radiated warmth and sunshine, but struggled for years, silently, with an eating disorder and crippling depression. While her friends scarfed pizza at 330 Triphammer, Katie ate raw mushrooms and baby carrots. She led the dancing at Alpha Delt parties, but she often seemed exhausted, even though she fought hard not to show it. We loved her to pieces, supported her efforts to be healthy, and tried not to ask too many questions.

Since college, we've had the privilege of loving Katie for another 10-plus years. Our little circle of Pi Phi sisters (to all of us, "my girls") grew up, grew better and bolder, and

became more open as we developed our adult selves together. We celebrated our accomplishments, released our secrets, talked through our challenges, and flew to all corners of the country for "mini-symposiums"the term Katie coined for weddings, reunions, long layovers, and any other excuse to get together. Every hours-long phone conversation, birthday mix, intriguing question, and surprise postcard reminded us of how lucky we were to have Katie touching our lives. We're heartbroken that she was unable to see that same easy beauty in herself. We will miss Katie's smile, selflessness, curiosity, laugh, friendship, and sisterhood, and we thank her for those priceless gifts.

To honor Katie's memory, her family asks friends to seek out a meaningful encounter with a homeless person (perhaps share names, a conversation, or a meal), or to make a contribution to valleyandmountain .org.
