In an attempt to make the most out of the session, I tried to make it as interactive as possible—opening up the floor to questions, incorporating members' prior work experience, and literally going around the room to shake each person's hand to teach a proper handshake.

Based on the positive feedback received following the workshop, I believe this event

was very successful. Building off this, I want to set up a day that is essentially a "Phase II" event to break up the information session according to desired industry. Then, given the desired industry, recruit seniors and alumnae who have already gone through similar experiences to share their insights, allowing members can gain first-hand knowledge of how to proceed in the field they may want to pursue.

I once read that "a house is much more than a mere shelter; it should lift us emotionally and spiritually." I never really understood that statement until this past summer. As with so many of the lessons that I've learned, I owe this lesson to our beloved home.

For more than 50 years, 330 Triphammer Road has provided a safe, supportive environment for generations of young women caught in the sometimes stressful, but never boring, transition to adulthood. Its walls have borne witness to a full spectrum of emotions and experiences—heartache, joy, anger, and first experiences with death and love—providing comfort and protection in the midst of a tumultuous world. Those who have never had the privilege to live (either as a resident or an out-of-house member) in a sorority house may never understand the value of such an edifice;

but those of us who have been fortunate enough to partake in the "house experience" can never forget the value.

Anything that we value must be maintained and, periodically, enhanced. This past summer, we were fortunate enough-through the support of our generous house corporation and a gift from the chapter-to improve upon our home by redecorating the vast majority of the first floor. Stephanie Wright, of The Wright Décor in Ithaca, conceptualized and executed a gorgeous new design for our house. The entire space—from foyer to television room to sitting area to dining room-flows seamlessly. Blues, creams, browns, and burgundies intermingle to create a harmonious, peaceful, and sumptuous visual experience. The mixture of several textures-wood, metal, fabric, and glass—adds depth and interest to the space.

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Perhaps the most striking aspect of Stephanie's design is the way the delicate balance of beauty and functionality makes the space an absolute pleasure to live in.

To be sure, most of the richness of

the "house experience" comes from the women who fill it, but the atmosphere-the foundation of homeis created by its aesthetics: the comfort of a chair placed just so, the reflection of light cast at just the right angle, the balance of intimacy and privacy created by a well-organized conversation area. Having been revitalized and restored, 330 Triphammer will continue to be not only our shelter, but our source of emotional and spiritual nourishment. Please stop by and visit us here at the NY Delta house, the atmosphere has been set beautifully, but your sisterhood is what will continue to make this house a home.


to work for such a young company because I was able to interact with the founder on a daily basis.

guidance documents for our chapters.




