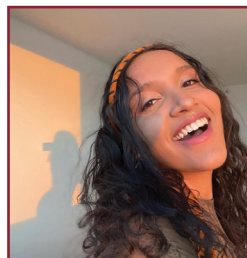

The next celebrated is **Pranjal Jain '23**, who founded Global Girlhood, an organization that uplifts women worldwide and their accomplishments, and who co-hosts the Brown Sugar Pod podcast, which discusses South Asian experiences in sex and love. Her social justice advocacy is beyond admirable and truly pioneers the area of Generation Z South Asia representation.

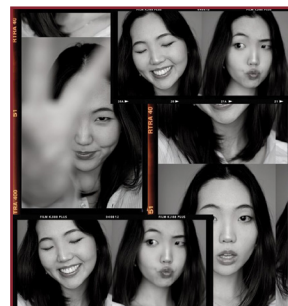

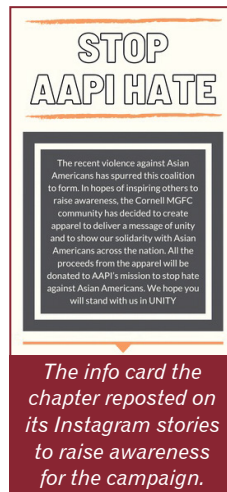
FUNDRAISING FOR #STOPAAPIHATE

Last semester, we got a taste of the world of virtual fundraising, an environment where we have to rely on our skills of social persuasion and influence on online platforms to ensure we get our message across. However, with this new skillset and the sheer number of people who use social media frequently enough to see our campaigns, we may see a shift in how we conduct philanthropy in the coming years.

This March, we teamed up with the Cornell Multicultural and Fraternal Council in response to the rise in Asian American violence to raise money for the #StopAAPIHate Campaign. Of the 12 multicultural organizations, we joined five MGFC groups and Alpha Epsilon Phi, another sorority on our campus, to spread the concept of unity through apparel.

Pi Delta Psi, an Asian interest fraternity on campus, designed apparel with translations of 18 Asian languages encompassing the word "unity" written in all caps.

Pi Delta Psi created this design to remind each other that we are all made equal; villainizing a particular racial group to the point of serious violence only brings us all further apart.

We reposted the graphic with an apparel preorder form on Instagram for two days so all

of our followers could see the much-needed message. The NY Delta Chapter is honored to have participated in this fundraiser that raised over \$1,000 for the campaign. At such difficult times, coming together to stand in solidarity for the Asian American community is the absolute least we can do.

The organizer of the fundraiser, Derek Xie '23 from Pi Delta Psi, mentioned that he was surprised by the number of orders from the Panhellenic community on campus. Since our social circles differ, we made a measurable difference in the audience they reached with the campaign. Hopefully, we can continue to build a positive relationship with MGFC on campus and collaborate with them on even more events. Being a part of the Panhellenic community on Cornell's campus comes with the responsibility of acknowledging our privilege in Greek life. Supporting MGFC and its efforts to raise Asian American voices is only the beginning of uplifting and building bonds with Cornell's other Greek communities.
