Our Home Is Getting a Facelift

Starting in early June, we installed new energy-efficient sliding windows on the second and third floors. This improvement will moderate the heat exchange between the bedrooms, floors, and outdoor elements, thus making the house more energy efficient. We gave careful consideration to increasing exterior flashing along the third floor's dormer to prevent water from damaging the new stucco and windowsills. Over time, the copper will patina and blend with the other flashing around the porches.

We had a "mighty blue" construction lift the crew used to shift around the exterior. When the old windows were removed and then boarded, our house was not a pretty sight! Once installed, the new windows, now a "cashmere cream" instead of white, blend well with the brick facade. Next summer's schedule includes installing the first floor and basement windows, along with painting the soffits and other trim to match the new window color. We will then clean

the brick facade and install new gutters.

The electrical service upgrade is underway and is planned to be completed at semester break. The service will enter the house underground and provide more capacity for the facility, needed with today's electrical demand.

For the first time at Cornell, I felt secure, protected, and loved. Prameela, currently excelling at Columbia Law school, taught me how to be a leader and advocate not only for myself but for those around me. Jordan, brilliant among her current class at Harvard Medical School, taught me how discipline and hard work pays off but also about humility and self care. Sarah taught me about independence and self-reliance, and **Chloe** demonstrated what true empathy really looks like. We hosted



When I returned to Ithaca last year to work at the Statler Hotel on Cornell's campus, within weeks, Lori Allen Utter Hamor '84 reached out to me to find if I would be interested in supporting our local Pi Phis and the upcoming house improvements. Lori and I have known each other for more than 40 years; I was her pledge mom, and as much as I would have loved to jump right in, I needed to first focus on starting my new position as the director of sales and marketing.

Once I settled in, Lori virtually introduced me to Susan H. Murphy '73, PhD '94. I met Susan in person a few weeks before this year's reunion. I had known of Susan's accomplishments at Cornell, but

I did a little sleuthing to get to know her even better. When I typed in "Susan Murphy/Cornell" on the Internet, as you can imagine, a long list of topics came up. The one that caught my eye was her "last lecture." What an extraordinary speech! At that moment, I learned what is truly near and dear to her heart: gratitude and friendship. This explains her dedication to our house and all the sisters at New York Delta Pi Beta Phi.

Our annual reunion Open House at our beloved home at 330 Triphammer Road coincided with Susan's 50th reunion. Secretly, a letter was sent to alumnae celebrating their 45th, 50th, and 55th reunions, as well as to Pi Phis living in the nearby area, to attend the open house celebrating Susan's accomplishments. Over 50 sisters and friends joined us on June 10th for our surprise celebration. And, a surprise it was!

Lori, on behalf of CHC, AAC, and core planning committee members, including Laura J. Clark '85, Cheryl J. Kessler '84, Laurel M. Kruke '08, and Tracy L. Stein '92, beautifully recognized Susan's accomplishments and dedication to Pi Phi. For those who might not know of Susan's achievements, it is an incredible list:

Susan was initiated in 1970, and as an undergraduate, Susan was a house manager and received the Amy Burnham Onken Award for the chapter, which recognizes an initiated member in their senior class who has best lived up to the Pi Beta Phi qualities of excellent scholarship, outstanding campus participation, and community service.

After graduating in 1973, Susan later returned to Cornell and began her 38-year career on campus.



Susan worked for 16 years in admissions and financial aid, including nine as dean. She was initially the Associate Director of Admissions and then became the Ivy League's first female Dean of Admissions and Financial Aid.

After receiving her PhD, Susan became Cornell's first Vice President for Student and Academic Services in 1994 until her retirement in 2016. Over the years, Susan's service and dedication to Cornell have been recognized in many ways, including...an endowment in her name for a Cornell Tradition fellowship, the naming of the Court Hall lobby in her honor, and the naming of a floor in the University Health Services facility: the Susan H. Murphy Administration and Health Promotion Floor.

Yet all the while, Susan continued her leadership here at Pi Phi. As a graduate, Susan was New York Delta's AAC

finance advisor, and then became the AAC chair in 1993 for two years.

In 1998, Susan was awarded an international Carolyn Helman Lichtenberg Crest Award, recognizing alumnae who positively impact their community through professional success and volunteer service.

In 2006, Susan became the secretary of our Chapter House Corporation (CHC) for ten years and has been our CHC treasurer for seven years now and hopefully many more!

The culmination of the celebration was the presentation of a bronze plaque (pictured right) in Susan's honor, to be placed at a tree planted when our landscaping improvements are under way, that reads: This tree is planted to celebrate Susan H. Murphy '73, Ph.D. '94 in grateful recognition for her leadership and dedication to making New York Delta Pi Beta Phi a better place to live and learn from its roots to its blooms.

We are so very grateful for everything Susan has done by leading the way for women in the world of academia and for the love and devotion to our house


