

CHAPTER HOUSE CORPORATION "DOINGS"

Welcome again to the Chapter House Corporation "Doings" news corner! We have been making strides in scheduling our second and third-floor window replacements to begin this summer along with the electrical upgrade of our current system. We are excited for these projects to begin!

COVID-19 pushed back many contractors on projects and the availability of building materials has also been detained for quite some time. Despite these challenges, the architectural firm that has been supporting us through this whole process was able to secure a reputable contractor. The work for the window installments and repair of the thirdfloor dormers will begin in June. Plans for the first floor and basement window replacements are likely to take place next summer. The electrical upgrade will support the increasing demands of the house, as well as any addition to the facility should that become desired in the future. In our quest to reduce our carbon footprint, the upgrade also will allow for completely electrifying the house as the combustion units need to be replaced.

We hope to accomplish even more yet support for a fundraising campaign is necessary. We are grateful for the sisters who have reached out to us, and we hope for more volunteers to create a dynamic team. JUMPING FOR JOY


