This year has been remarkable for reconnecting with alumnae, whether in person at Cornell Reunion and Homecoming or through Zoom, phone calls, and emails. Thanks to the foundational efforts of alumnae involved in the Our House, Our Legacy capital campaign, sisters have united to give back with their time and generous contributions. We are thrilled to announce that as of November 15, 2024, we have raised \$468,000 from 93 alumnae donors! Most of these funds have come from leadership gifts during the campaign's quiet phase, and we are deeply grateful to these alumnae for their steadfast support.

Thank you to our volunteers. This success wouldn't have been possible without the dedication of the majorgifts campaign committee volunteers, who have worked tirelessly to reconnect with their New York Delta friends and encourage their participation in the campaign. These women have led the way, and we are incredibly thankful for their efforts.

In honor of our own Cornell home at 330 Triphammer Road, we officially launched the campaign's public phase during Cornell's Homecoming weekend. We shared news of the campaign with all NY Delta alumnae in mailings that included details about the campaign, how the funds will improve our Chapter House, and how to make a gift. If you didn't receive this information, please contact us! We'd love to ensure everyone stays informed.

It's been wonderful to welcome alumnae back to the house this year during reunion and Homecoming and when NY Deltas happen to travel back to Ithaca. During these recent visits, sisters had the opportunity

to see some of the most recent capital improvements. This summer, a new electrical service that began with removing the overhead wires from the building and running them under the parking lot was completed. This part of the project ultimately enabled Pi Beta Phi the option to replace fuel-powered appliances and equipment with electrical units in the future. The new electrical system has the capacity to service a potential addition to the full structure, should an expansion be necessary and approved. Another electrical enhancement included replacing interior and exterior lighting fixtures with energy-efficient LED alternatives. In addition, the second phase of our window replacement project was completed on the first floor and basement. Soffits were repaired and painted, new gutters and downspouts were added and the three entrances were freshened with new paint. Next summer, the focus will

be on improving our landscape and pathways.

Our goal is to raise \$1,000,000 to complete all projects outlined for the Chapter House through the calendar year 2025, and we hope to have every NY Delta alumna participate! In the coming weeks and months, you'll hear from fellow sisters about the campaign and have the opportunity to ask questions. 
PHILANTHROPY

Neurosurgery Research Assistant

This database will serve as a foundation for researching various factors that may predict outcomes related to cervical myelopathy. I also worked on conducting a scoping review on the role of AI in patient education, which was recently published in Frontiers in Medicine. Currently, I am working on a similar scoping review that evaluates the use of AI in medical education. I have loved working on these projects and want to continue learning about research within the field of neurosurgery and medical education.
