#### **OUR HOUSE, OUR LEGACY**

The upcoming capital campaign for NY Delta that you have heard about in earlier editions of Delta Doings continues in its early stage of conversations with sisters who have expressed interest in leadership of the campaign, both in terms of their time and their giving. We've been busy reconnecting with Pi Phi alumnae, especially those of you about to celebrate your reunion.

Part of our early work included the development of our campaign logo and theme: Our House, Our Legacy. We arrived at this theme because want to welcome new sisters to our house on Triphammer Road for years to come. In order to ensure its sustainability and continued appeal as an inviting place to live while at Cornell, there are some projects in need of our attention.

If you've been on campus since the summer, you might have noticed some improvements already! Due to our solid financial position, we were able to begin with the replacement of windows with ones that are both visually appealing and energy efficient. Upcoming projects needing alumnae support include a new electrical service, which includes

replacing interior and exterior lighting with LED alternatives. Completing window replacement on the first floor and basement level, along with the repair and painting of the soffits, replacing the gutters and downspouts, and refreshing the entrances are all planned for this coming summer.

As we look to the summer of 2025, work will be dedicated to exterior projects that enhance the "curb appeal" of 330 Tripham-

mer, including updating the walkway and front entrance of the house, making it more accessible, as well as redoing the landscaping to create more open and inviting spaces. Our Chapter Room will also be refreshed with a much-needed coat of paint, new flooring, and additional electrical outlets.

We're planning a special reception at the chapter house during Reunion weekend,

on Saturday, June 8, from 3:00–5:00 pm and welcome those who are back on campus to visit the house and to learn more about the plans for the house. For those not planning to attend Reunion this year, we will have more events planned in the coming months, including some virtual opportunities to reconnect!

Speaking of Reunion, we don't want sisters in the '04 and '09 grad years to miss

out on the benefit of Cornell class and Reunion credits as they pertain to early gifts to our campaign. If you decide to make a gift to the Pi Phi campaign gift before June 30 and it's your reunion year this year, your gift will count toward your class reunion totals!
