With just over a month remaining at Cornell before graduation, I've found myself reflecting often on the past four years. I am undoubtedly a very different person than the one who first arrived in Ithaca. I have learned countless lessons, experienced moments that fundamentally shifted my worldview, and most meaningfully, built relationships that have brought tremendous richness to my life. I can say with complete sincerity that I credit my time in Pi Phi with many of these experiences and friendships.

When I first came to Cornell, I was uncertain about Greek Life as a

whole, choosing not to participate in formal recruitment during my freshman year. It wasn't until two close friends who had joined Pi Phi encouraged me to participate in that fall's Continuous Open Bidding that I began to see myself in a sorority. From the very beginning, the women of Pi Phi made me feel seen, safe, and expressed a special zest for life that I have not found anywhere else. The decision to join Pi Phi was one of the easiest I have ever made. Since then, Pi Phi has played an integral role in shaping my time at Cornell. A campus that

once felt so big and formidable, is now studded with the familiar faces of sisters offering a smile, an update on the Zeus line, or a story about their weekend as we pass by one another. Pi Phi has

made Cornell feel less like a vast unknown and more like a community where every class, club, or activity promises at least one sister, or a sister willing to try it out with me.

No reflection on Pi Phi would be complete without mentioning my extraordinary member class. From the very first day we met, we


formed an immediate and meaningful bond. These ten
